School closures due to the flu outbreak have been common this year. Of course, students hope for snow days and a few extra days out of school, but few want to be absent due to illness. There are three types of influenza that are more prevalent this year. H3N2 is the most dominant strand of the flu that people have had during this season's outbreak. It is not considered to be at the epidemic point yet, but serious enough that the CDC is using every media venue to spread the word about the importance of getting vaccinated.

The vaccine that is being administered to fight this year's strand of the flu contains the three most common strands of influenza that is circulating. This year's vaccine is about 60% effective. According to Stephanie Bunch, who is studying to become a nurse practitioner, "the vaccine is definitely not perfect, but it is the best means to fight against a widespread outbreak of the flu."

Since the only defense against the flu is to develop the most effective vaccine and deliver it to as many people as possible, there was a nation-wide public education effort to encourage everyone to get vaccinated. Mark Bighorse, a first responder, said, "Cherokee Nation EMTs (continued on page 2)

#### **PROM**


